

South African Foreign Policy: Identities, Intentions, and Directions

Edited by David R. Black and David J. Hornsby, this book explores post-apartheid South African foreign policy, its identities, direction, and intentions. It aims to deepen the understanding of South Africa's evolving foreign policy by examining key bilateral relationships with both the global 'South' (Brazil, China, Iran, the African Union) and 'North' (Japan and the United Kingdom). By sketching the contours of these relationships, the contributors offer insights into the cross-pressures shaping South African foreign policy. The work also add depth to the idea of South Africa as an emerging "middle power", especially with respect to challenges such as regionalism, multilateralism, reform of global governance, and approach to moral leadership.
